Rod fishing bye-laws

River Loughor and Teifi (Salmon and Sea Trout season): 20 March to 17 October;

River Loughor and Teifi (Brown Trout season): 3 March to 30 September.

Angling for Salmon before 16 June, must be with an artificial fly or artificial lure; and any Salmon caught before 16 June must be returned with minimum injury and minimum delay.

Remember to always carry your P.A.A permit and EA licence.

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


for **May...**

Obituary...Arthur Williams



Arthur Williams – one of the Pioneers of night fly fishing on the River Loughor

Honoury Life Member, Arthur Williams passed away peacefully on 8th March 2006, aged 90.

Those longer serving members will remember the infamous 'Y Vagwr' boys that were of course Arthur and his brother Ivor Williams.

To me, Arthur was one of the pioneers of night fly fishing for Sea Trout on the River Loughor. I always saw him as the 'Welsh Hugh Falkus'.

Being my great uncle, I have fond memories listening to him relaying fishy stories of years gone by.

Arthur and Ivor would travel to Ynys Llety, two-up on an old BSA motorbike for a nights fishing. They rarely returned without fish. As the story goes, during their 'hay-day' they would have to stop fishing only because they couldn't carry the fish home! Of course, the river was full of fish then... if only.

Arthur was also an expert fly tier.
Unaided by a vice, he would tie the neatest of patterns whilst holding the hook in his hand. One of his infamous patterns was known as 'The Badger', (dressing withheld!) which of course utilised the course hair from the animal itself. This fly accounted for hundreds of Sewin during his life time.

Arthur Williams was a much respected angler who will be sadly missed. Our thoughts are with his family. May he rest in peace.
