
Where is the rain?...

starting around the first week of
June. Being a member of the Herring
family, the Shad is the only salt
water fish to spawn in freshwater.

I had two very interesting days fishing/photography, catching fish up to 2lbs on large goldhead nymphs. I will certainly be returning next year for some more action.
