Out and about...

Garnffrwd fishery

I have recently provided 'Today's Flyfisher' with a feature on our local Garnffrwd trout fishery, Drefach, near Cross Hands.

The 5 acre lake, owned and run by Jamie Miller is positioned in the most idyllic of locations. The well established, lake with crystal clear water experiences great fly hatches, and offers the fly fisherman a great opportunity to fish imitative patterns. It is stocked with mostly rainbows, but there are also some lovely brown trout resident. The well positioned wooden walk wavs are particularly good for beginners. There is also a fishing lodge, with a kettle and a colour TV! A four fish ticket costs £18. but many anglers favour the Catch and Release option at £10. This is great value, especially when the average size of fish is 3lb. I highly recommend a visit to Garnffrwd - you will be pleasantly surprised! Chalk Stream heaven

Yes, I was fortunate enough to be asked to take photographs on the famous River Test at Stockbridge, Hampshire. I was there to document a beginner being taught how to 'up stream' dry fly fish for brown trout.

We had access to a private stretch at Bossington. The river exceeded all my expectations – but I was there to do a job, and unfortunately didn't get to cast a fly. Nevertheless, I discovered that you can actually get to fish these exclusive waters, but of course at a cost. It would usually cost £200 a day for two rods. Expensive? Yes, but you and a mate can fish the best chalk stream river in the UK for £100 each. It's worth considering, I know I'll be giving it a go soon.
